TRAINING

AWR-118 Biological Incidents Awareness (NCBRT) 8 hrs. This course provides a brief overview of biological incidents that have occurred; biological agents that are naturally occurring, could be accidentally released, or could be used deliberately; the typical course of disease and how that may vary in a deliberate incident; an overview of biological agents as terrorist weapons; and methods of protection from biological agents (with emphasis on protection using methods and equipment readily available to emergency responders and the general public) June 15th, 2017 8:30 a.m. – 5:30 p.m.

AWR-122C Law Enforcement Prevention and Deterrence of Terrorist Acts

(NCBRT) 4 hrs. This course, also known as Fraudulent Documents, provides participants with an overview of general security features employed by the U.S. government to establish the validity of government documents, as well as known methods used to alter or counterfeit the types of documents commonly presented to law enforcement officers. Several government documents are discussed, including identity cards, driver's licenses and social security cards. June 15th, 2017 8:30 a.m. – 12:30 p.m.

AWR-135 Promoting Community Cybersecurity (TEEX) 4 hrs. Provides participants an introduction to basic cybersecurity topics as well as the Community Cyber Security Maturity Model (CCSMM). Through the use of case studies, participants will examine the characteristics within each dimension of the CCSMM that facilitate becoming a cyber resilient community, as well as actions that are counterproductive to cyber resiliency. Participants will utilize this information to determine how they can improve cybersecurity and cyber resiliency in their organizations and communities. June 15th, 2017 8:30 a.m. – 12:30 p.m.

AWR-136 Essentials of Community Cybersecurity (TEEX) 4hrs. Provides participants with an introduction to concepts related to community cybersecurity. Participants will examine the different types of cyber-attacks, how communities are vulnerable to cyber-attacks and incidents, and what types of organizations are most likely to be targeted. This course will also introduce the participants to the Community Cyber Security Maturity Model and how to use the model to build a community cybersecurity program and their cyber resilience. June 15th, 2017 (2 Sessions) 8:30 a.m. – 12:30 p.m. and 1:30 p.m. – 5:30 p.m.

AWR-219 Site Protection through Observational Techniques (SPOT) (NCBRT) 4

hrs. Participants are provided an overview of threat and vulnerability analyses and how these can be used to establish effective defenses. Participants are also provided with an overview of security operations that can be applied for prevention and detection of potential terrorist acts. Participants can incorporate this course into planning for chemical, biological, radiological, nuclear and explosive (CBRNE) component and device interdiction, conduction behavioral assessments, implementing screening operations, conducting non-intrusive inspections, scene control, evacuation, and media relations. June 15th, 2017 1:30 p.m. – 5:30 p.m.

AWR-326 Tornado Awareness (NDPTC) 8 hrs. Understanding of the basics of tornado science, the weather forecasting process, and the tornado warning process. Learn concepts of how to better able to implement safety measures for you, your family, and your organization in preparation for tornado season. Tornadoes can strike anywhere in the United States with little or no warning and are capable of causing significant loss of life and billions of dollars in damages. It is important that every community be prepared by understanding tornadoes and the associated dangers.

AWR-331 Winter Weather Hazards: Science & Preparedness (NDPTC) 8 hrs. Increase your understanding of the latest in winter weather science, forecasting, warning, and best practices in preparedness. Enhance your ability to identify and describe the hazards associated with winter weather and to better prepare for and mitigate the impacts of snow, sleet, freezing rain, and dangerously low temperatures.
